SWAP is the action lead for Outcome 2 of the Community Plan 2030 – *Older People lead more independent,* engaged and socially connected lives

- 2011 Census shows population for FODC was 113,161 with 22,114 (19.5%) aged 60+
- The district is primarily rural with only two large towns, Enniskillen & Omagh. It has 5 towns – Carrickmore, Dromore, Fintona, Irvinestown & Lisnaskea. The rest of the population live in 48 villages or in the countryside.











SWAP and FODC have been working on making Fermanagh & Omagh a more age friendly district since 2015

Early work included the development of an Age Friendly Checklist and an annual conference in the district

In 2018 a round of in-depth consultations began with the older people across the district utilising many different methods including face to face clusters

The Age Friendly Strategy for Fermanagh & Omagh was launched in March 2019 at the Annual Age Friendly Conference

Background

Working closely in partnership with Allison and SWAP, FODC have recognised that being such a rural district can lead to increased social isolation and issues with health and wellbeing.

Funding through NPA for PLACE-EE Project & through PHA for a Age Friendly Officer who started in post in September 2019

FODC also sit on the Age Friendly Network NI which are working on making Northern Ireland Age Friendly

These days more and more services are being carried out online from banking and shopping to making doctors appointments and the use of health apps and some people are being left behind which is creating greater isolation and loneliness

FODC decided to run Genealogy & Reminiscence courses as an introduction to the technology in a way that was focusing on more than just learning to use tablets and smartphones but also on building relationships
