Ireland's recession

Ireland's position vis-à-vis the recession is relatively unique

Not alone is the country affected by the global recession

But it is also exposed to the well-rehearsed severity and depth of the banking crisis and the parallel collapse in the public finances based on the bursting of the property bubble

These issues have un-chartable implications for the future <u>but</u> provide a hugely important <u>backdrop to</u> the development of new economic strategies

with particular reference to -

- 1. the economy's capacity to generate enterprise & employment opportunities and
- 2. the State's capacity to address issues such as enterprise development, entrepreneurship, unemployment, etc., and to adequately support initiatives proposed to address the crisis

Ireland/Dublin's current economy

- Small open economy relying heavily on trade with the outside world.
- Has not moved through a prolonged 'industrial' era into a more modern service driven economy.
- Instead, Ireland's economy, and particularly the economy of the Dublin City Region, has been rapidly catapulted toward a service economy
 - in which the internationally traded service sector plays an increasingly central role.

Dublin's recession

Sharp economic contraction in 2007-08 and the associated effects relating to market confidence, employment levels, credit provision and public/private finance, all affect the Dublin Region severely

- Accommodates nearly 30% population
- •Generates almost half of GVA
- Contains Ireland's only city of international scale

- To maximise the potential of the entire region




