



3. Vested Interests in Status Quo? Fragmentation & the Need to Co-operate!

- Fragmentation of Functional Socio-economic Areas (inappropriate local government areas)
- Fragmentation of the Functions of Government (separation of power and responsibility)
- Political fragmentation (dictated by speed & standards of the slowest)
- Fragmentation of Thinking & Vision ('zoning/land-use' plans not sufficient and too inflexible)










We need to challenge Fashion & Formulaic Planning!

It is often no more than hype or spin

- One size does not fit (e.g. affordable housing targets)
- The copy is never as good as the original (e.g. design guides, IFS)
- A set of projects don't make a strategy (e.g. Ecotowns)
- Often an illusion of change (shifting the deckchairs - e.g. traffic calming, localism)

We need to challenge the Triple Bottom-lining myth?

- Link Economy & Society (growing separation of people & jobs)
- Link Society & Environment (growing consumer demands)
- Link Economy & Environment (short term v. long term agendas)



We need to challenge ourselves as Planners!

• We are not the only professionals

• We are not necessarily expert

We cannot assume shared values / ethics

• We have not "always being doing it!"
