



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METHODOLOGY

LOCAL: Vulnerabilities and Capabilities Assessment

- To promote inclusive participation, community leadership and empowerment of vulnerable people.
- Local perspectives and priorities are critical for the success of any Community Resilience Plan
- For communities to better understand the nature and extent of existing, changing and emerging risks they are and will be facing.
- For communities to identify relevant and practical actions to reduce their risks and strengthen their resilience based on their priorities.
- To raise awareness and mobilise resources within the community and externally so that the community can implement its community resilience planning arrangements

Communities need to 'own' these plans and the analysis that led to them in order to put effort into implementing them
