

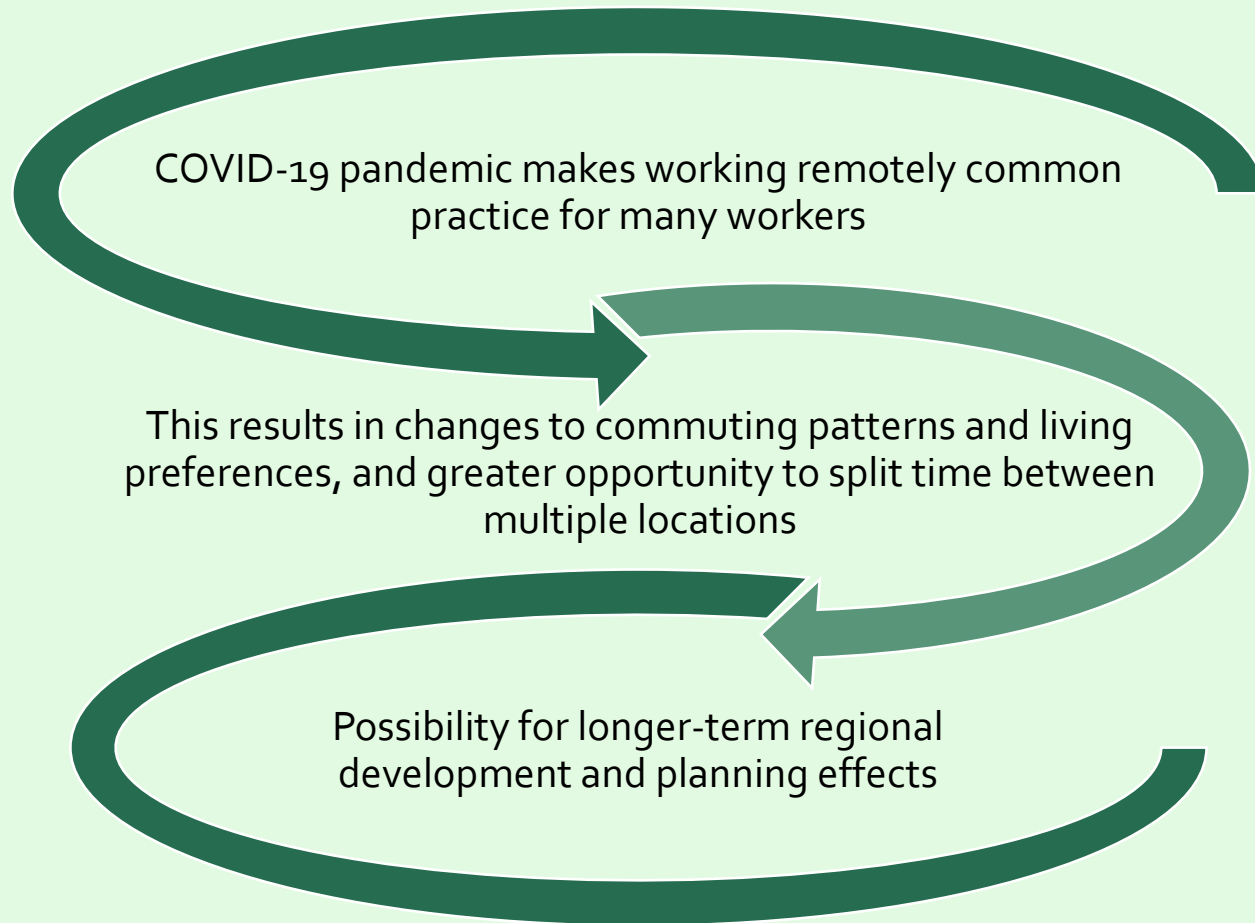



Increased remote work – Here to stay?

time...

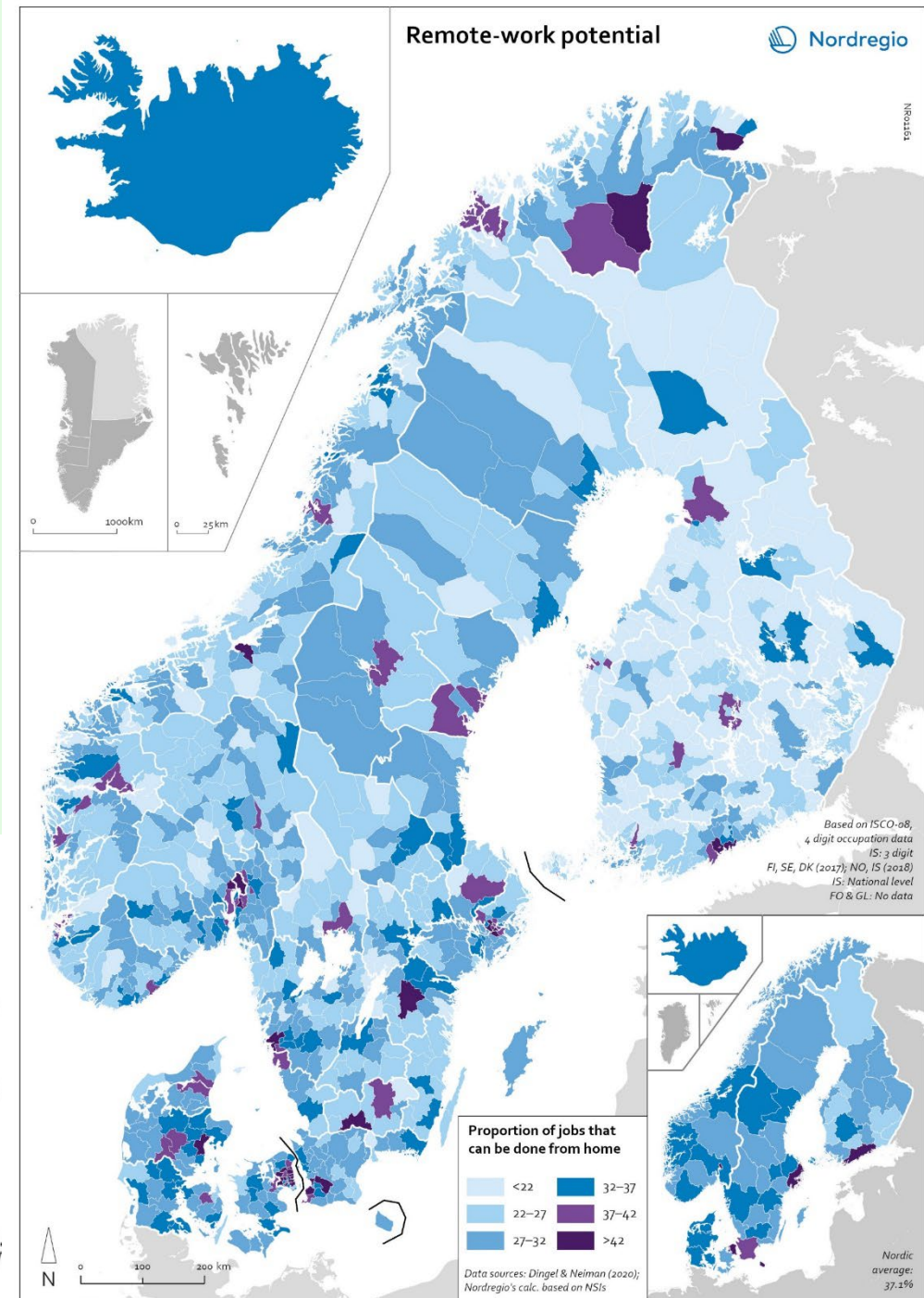
...and not for everyone.

- Nordic average 37.1%; the equivalent of 9.5 million jobs
- **Theoretical potential** but correlates well with the actual numbers of people working from home during the pandemic (in Sweden)
- Highest potential found in larger **urban areas**

Potential regional development and planning effects

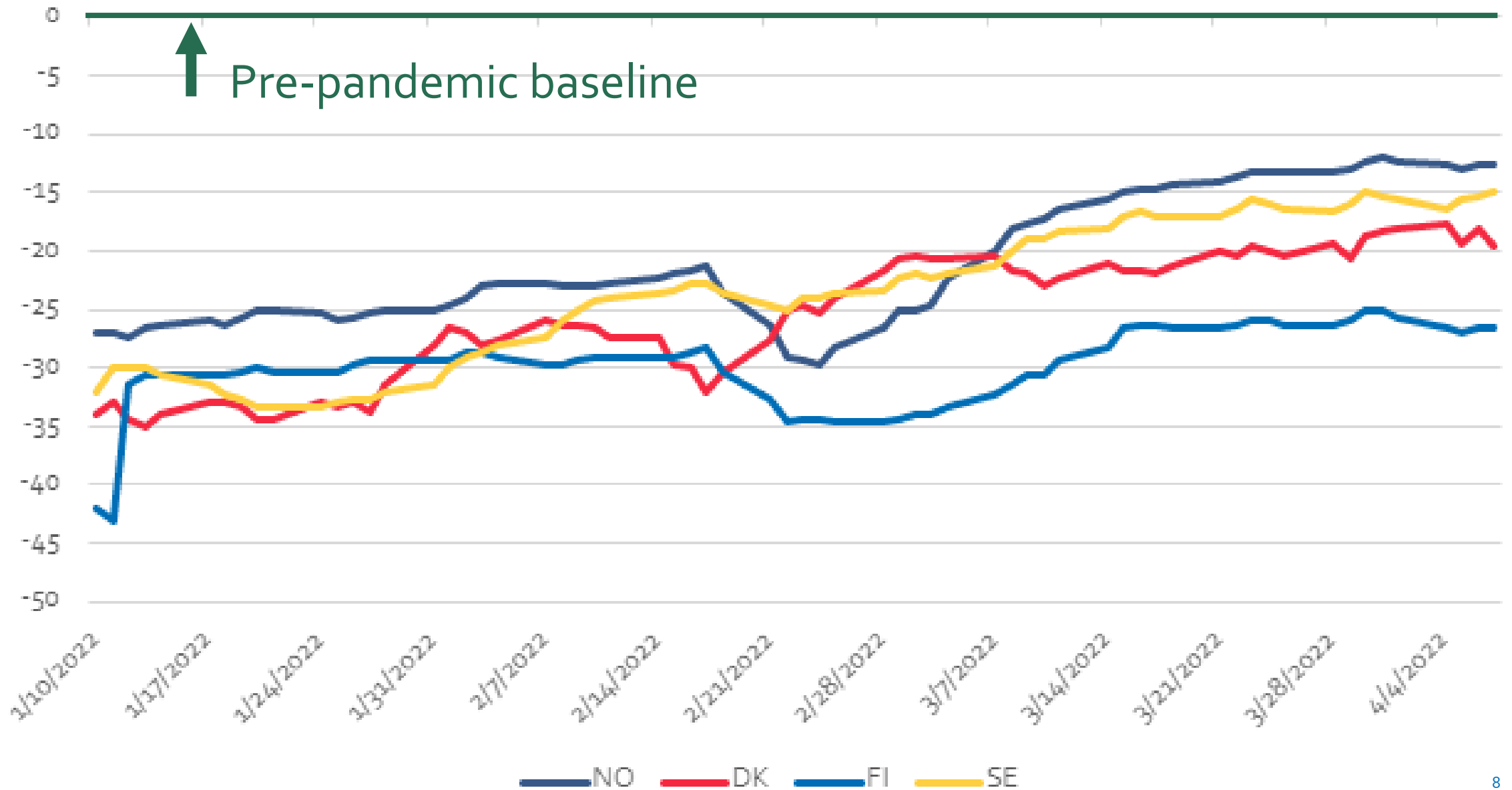
- Mobility (changes to daily movements)

Work related mobility in selected Nordic countries in early 2022

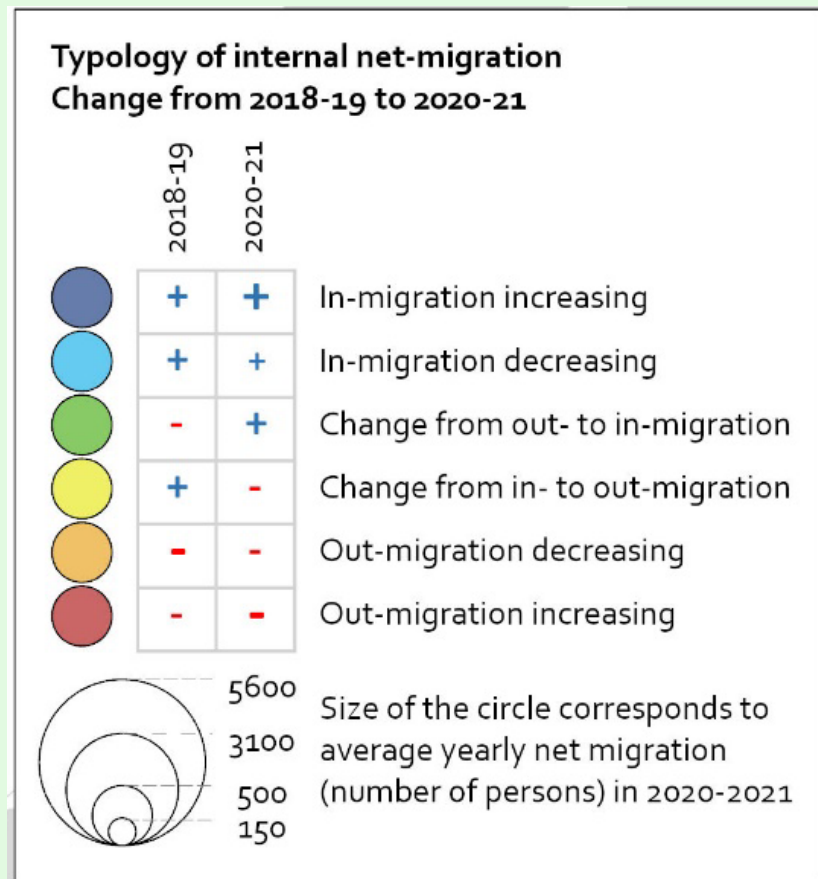




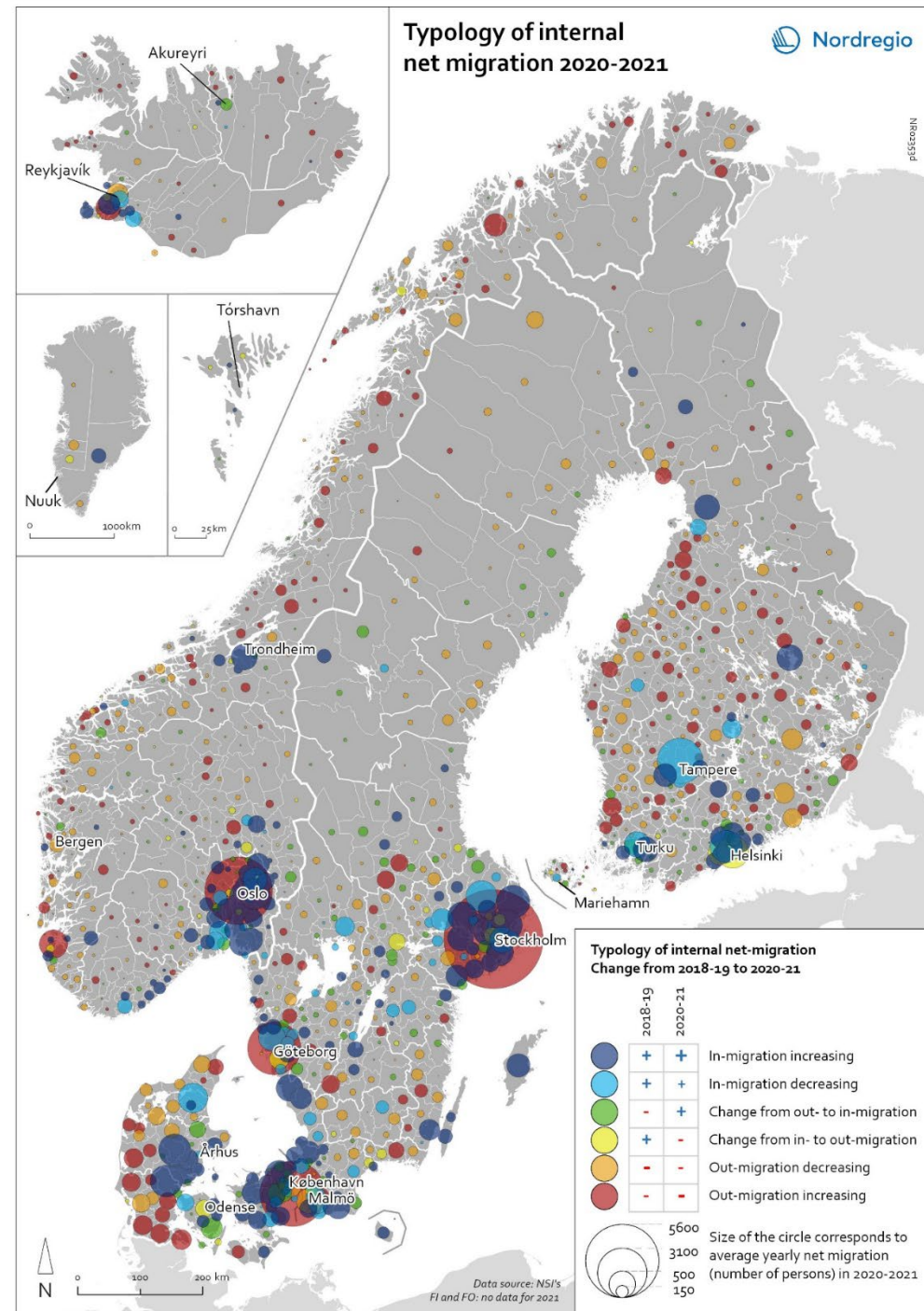

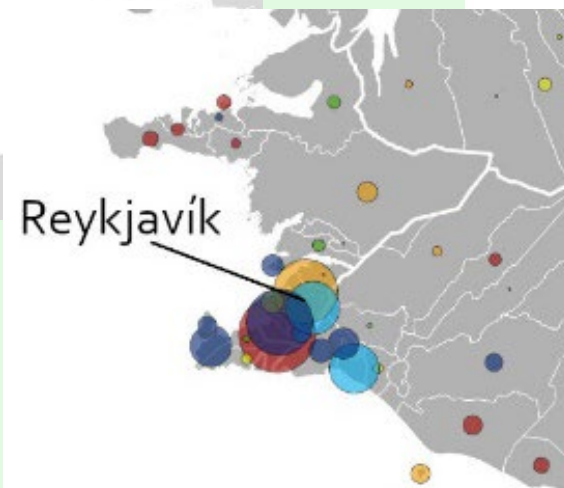
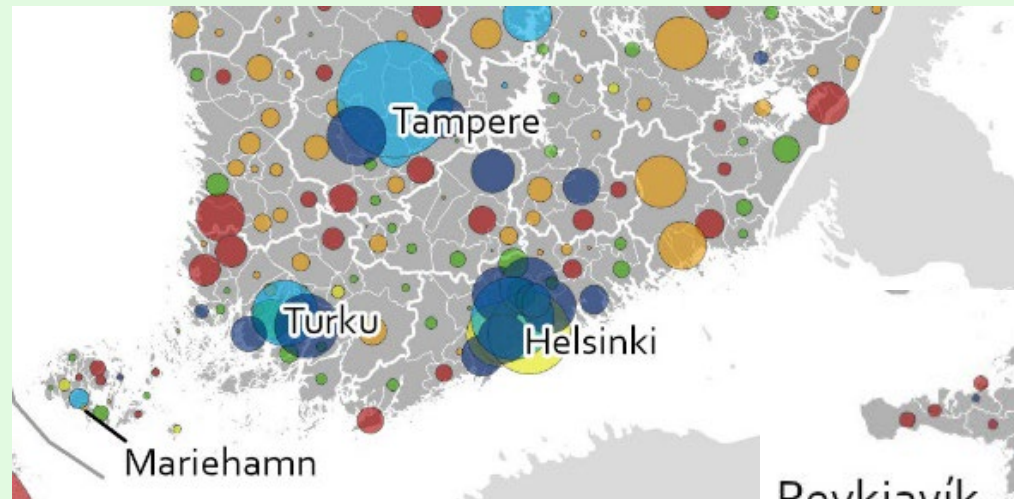
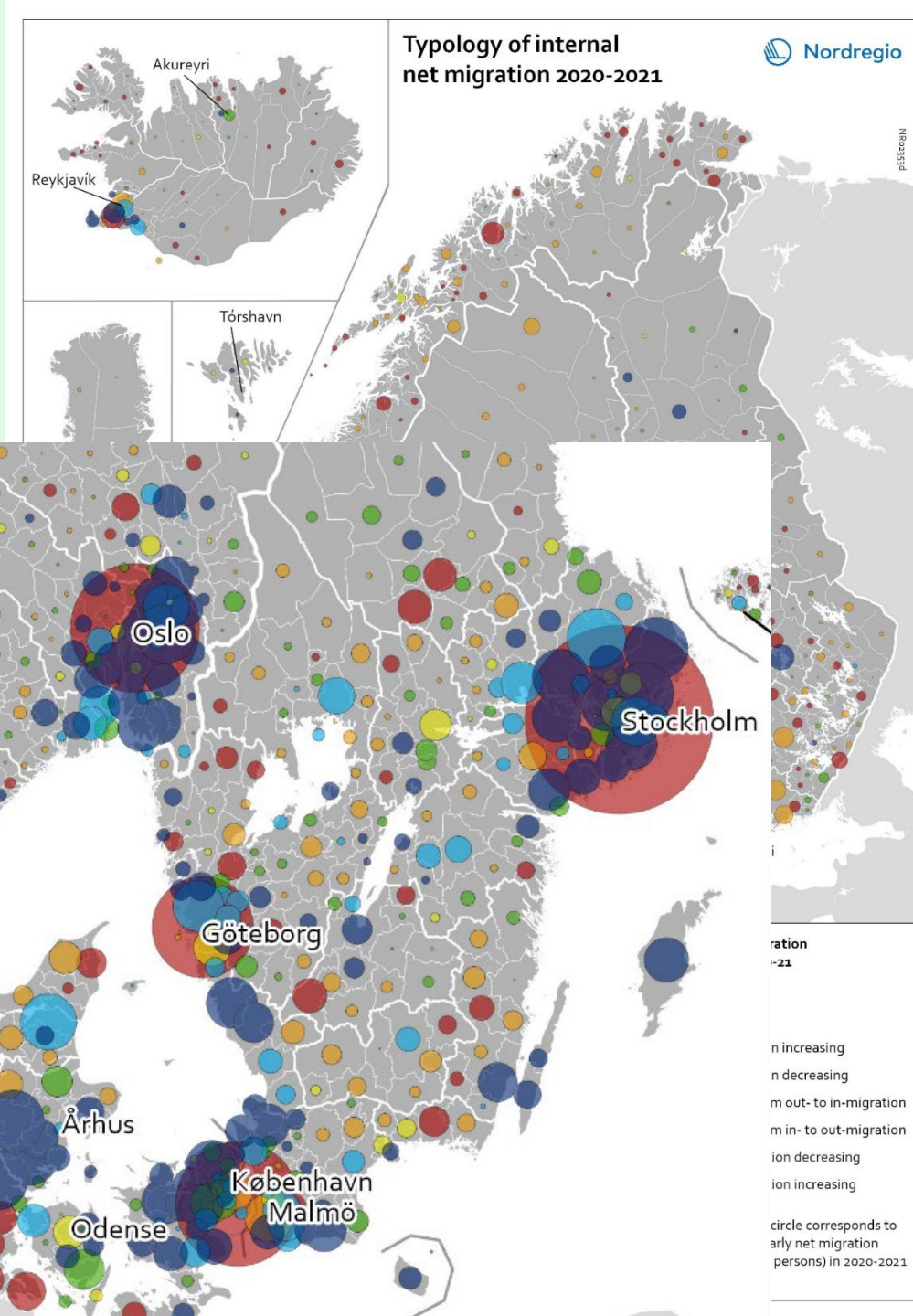
Typology of internal net migration 2020-2021*



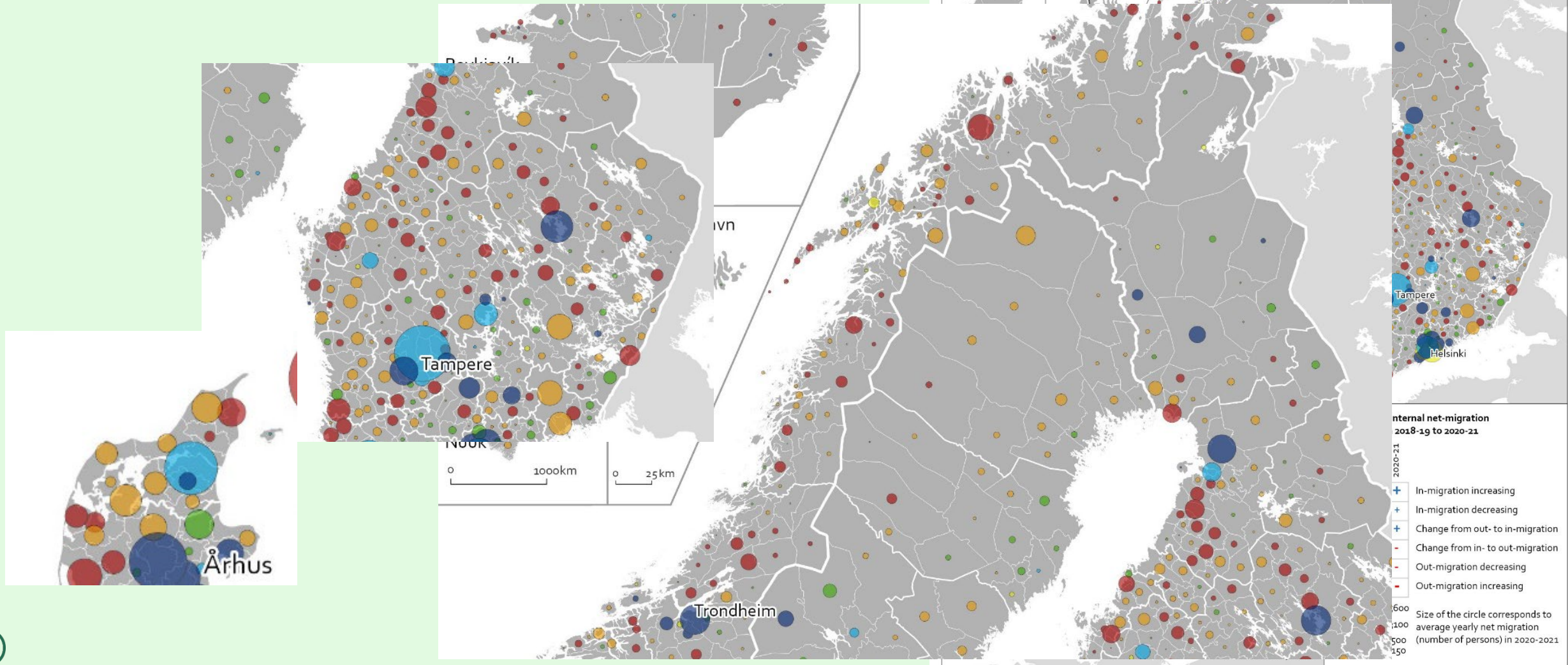
*Finland and Faroe Islands 2020

- Accelerated growth in municipalities surrounding the capital regions and larger cities (dark blue)

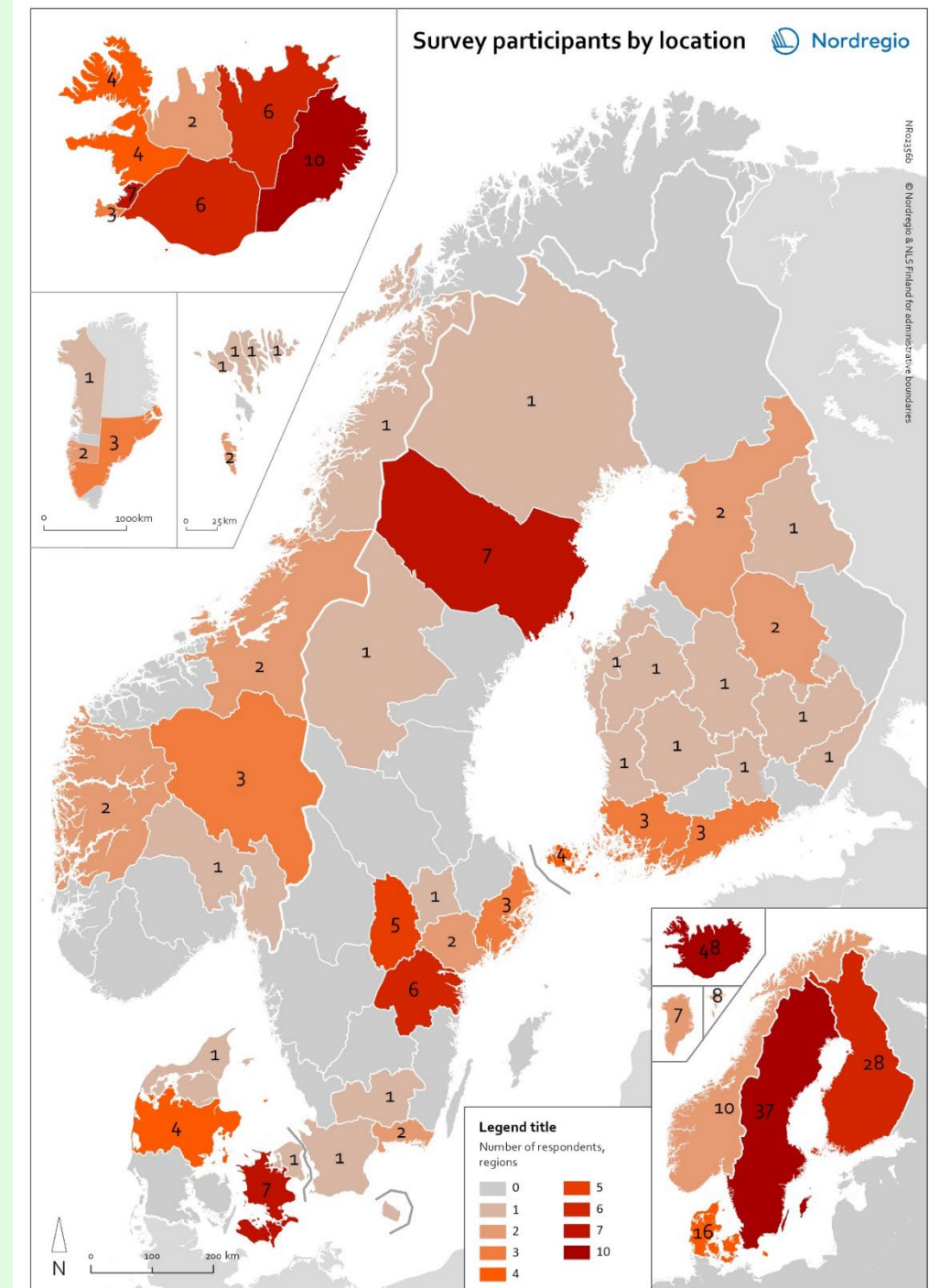


— Depopulation slowed (orange, 32%) or even turned around (green, 19%) in many (often rural) municipalities



Survey: Local and regional experiences

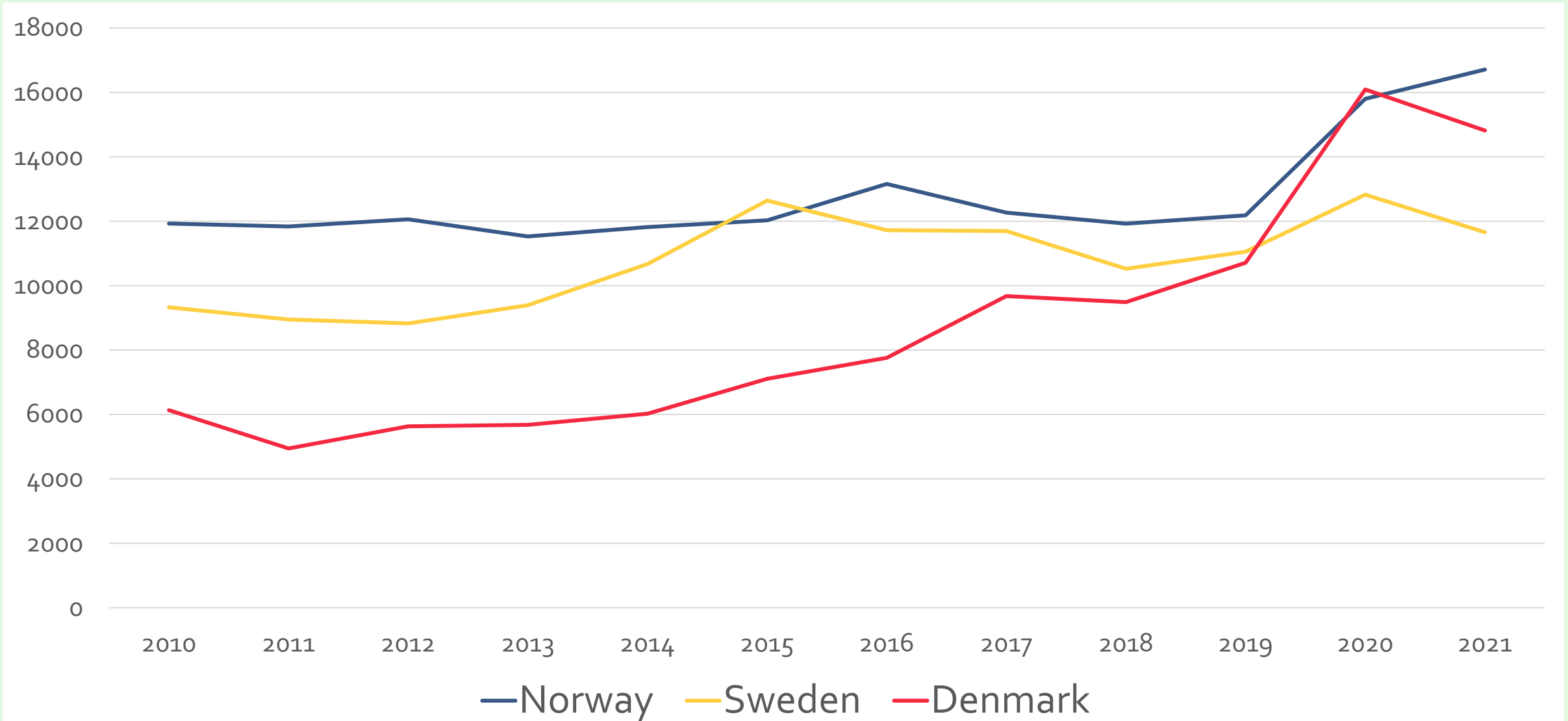
- At the local and regional level, the nature of the challenges and opportunities experienced appears to be fairly similar between the countries.
- Overall, survey participants were more likely to report positive changes in their permanent or temporary populations.
 - Generating opportunities for long-term economic growth, maintaining public services, and revitalising the community
 - Challenges particularly related to increased housing demand and pressure on public services and infrastructure.

Policy responses

Different starting points,
different stories:

- **Finland:** "Multilocality" high on the political agenda, particularly as a strategy to combat depopulation and ageing in rural areas.



Policy responses

Different starting points,
different stories:

- **Norway:** Opportunities for remote work in line with ongoing regional policy developments
- **Sweden:** Strong foundations but no clear direction evident
- **Denmark:** Regional policy links less clear



Some key takeaways

- Increased remote work is here to stay BUT not for everyone and not all the time.
- Migration, mobility and multilocality underwent changes, but unclear to what extent these are pandemic effects or the beginning of longer-term trends.
- The countries had similar experiences during the pandemic however the future direction varies somewhat depending on the pre-existing policy context in each country.



Key questions going forward

- How can increased remote work contribute to a more sustainable Nordic Region from a social, economic, and environmental perspective?
- Working remotely makes every region a cross-border region. What forms of cooperation are necessary to harness this opportunity for a more integrated Nordic Region?
